

Marie Mora on Puerto Rican Socioeconomic Outcomes in the US and the AEA Mentoring Program

Professor Marie Mora, who received her PhD in Economics from Texas A&M in 1996, was recently featured on a an “Economic Rockstar” podcast. During the podcast she discussed a variety of topics, including her research with Alberto Dávila and Havidán Rodríguez on Puerto Ricans; the slow recovery post-Maria in Puerto Rico; Hispanic entrepreneurs; the NSF-funded AEA Mentoring Program and the SMPC; the importance of collaborations and other topics.

In the podcast, she also discusses Texas A&M’s ASHE (American Society of Hispanic Economics) conference and how that conference assists underrepresented minority students who are considering a PhD program with graduate degree information and networking.
